

# Hain Daniels recalls Yorkshire Provender Jacket & Toast Toppers because of undeclared peanut

Hain Daniels is recalling Yorkshire Provender Jacket & Toast Toppers because they may contain peanuts which are not mentioned on the label. This means the product is a possible health risk for anyone with an allergy to peanuts.

This recall is linked to the wider issue of peanut contamination of mustard.
