


Overall Objective:

To: propose a vision and approach for the Target Operating Model (TOM) and a proposal for the future regulatory system

Key Deliverables (by end of March 2021). This programme remains under review as outlined in Paragraph 3.3 A refreshed work plan and revised milestones will be presented to the September Board.

- 1. Piloting new Food Standards Delivery Model Start delayed due to COVID-19 unlikely to commence before August 2020
- 2. Continued onboarding of Register A Food Business (RAFB) system and Enhanced Registration to more LAs, target 250 in total by end March '21Proactive onboarding paused due to COVID-19 revised target 250 but subject to LA Forward Plan for re-establishing official controls and ongoing impact of crises on LAs
- 3. RAFB essential maintenance work to address technical backlog and continue to deliver a robust stable service On-track
- 4. Proceed to live trials for Primary Authority National Inspections Strategies and evaluate how these can contribute to the regulation of compliant multi-site businesses, or co-ordinated groups of businesses. Trials paused indefinitely due to COVID-19. Timing will be linked to LA Forward Plan for re-establishing official controls but unlikely to commence before Q3.
- 5. Defining roles of the central competent authority, FSA, and competent authorities in relation to the Target Operating Model (TOM) for regulating relevant food businesses. Work on the TOM has been rescoped given C19 pressures and resource availability. The TOM will deliver an approach to regulation in one (or more) segments, informed by segmentation, and a clear set of regulatory tools to guide how the FSA intervenes (where I when / with whom). Having determined this, work to be undertaken on 'who' that will define the roles within this.
- 6. Dissemination of surveillance data on food sectors, such as imports, and food businesses to competent authorities, resulting in near real-time risk identification Work delayed due to C19 and review required. This approach to be informed by the segmentation analysis and updated following the outputs of the TOM workstream prior to September 2020.
- 7. Sophisticated segmentation by risk: A data-informed knowledge of food sector segmentation. This would contribute to Risk Engine and improved Local Authority guidance. Segmentation sprint underway and will deliver initial output by July 2020. Further sprints will be required to inform a coherent approach to segmentation.
- 8. Altering expectations around professional skill levels so that competent authorities can deploy skills and resources effectively in food business and offer appropriate assurance Competency Framework workstream progressing as planned with minor slippage to timeline.

To: develop a revised Operating Model that will effectively modernise and improve the delivery of Official Controls in meat, wine and dairy Key Deliverables (by end of March 2021)

- By August 2021 we will have a clearly defined revised target operating model for the delivery of Official Controls for meat, wine and dairy. In response, by end of March 2021 the FSA will have developed a new draft operating model, to be consulted upon and refined by August 2021.
- As part of the new approach to operational delivery, during 20/21 the Agency will have developed an IT solution for approvals leading to a more automated, cost effective and speedier engagement with FBOs.
